Minutes of a regular meeting of the Kaysville City Council held April 1, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of the Kaysville City Municipal Center.

CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Ken Gibbins explained that he commutes to Salt Lake City on his bike along the Rail Trail. This winter the gates were left open and the trail was plowed, making it very nice. He realizes that this is a UTA right-of-way, but the gates along the Rail Trail through Clearfield and Farmington are wider and easier to navigate. He would like to see the gates in Kaysville left open or the openings made wider.

Mayor Hiatt asked Council Member Garlick, the Council representative over Parks and Recreation, to look into that request.

YARD AND GARDEN COMMITTEE PRESENTATION ON WISE WATER CONSERVATION AND COMMUNITY GARDEN

Council Member Taylor explained that there are 19 active members of the Yard and Garden Committee. There are also six sub-committees with different members. Five business partners have agreed to help promote beautification of the City. Those businesses are: Tri City Nursery, Joe's Greenhouse, Bowmans Market, Goodson Signs, and USU Botanical Center. He explained that 21 people have signed up to participate in the community garden this year.

Ron Zollinger stated that the Yard and Garden tour will be held in the spring this year. He also explained that the Yard and Garden Committee recognized yards in December that were decorated for the Christmas holiday. The Committee is looking for a larger plot of ground for a future community garden.

Blake Walker, a member of the Yard and Garden Committee, explained
